Dear Partners and Community Members,

Thank you for taking the time to explore our annual report and for your continued support of our youth and programs! It is through your support that we are able to create meaningful, lasting change in the lives of our youth.

This year has been one of exciting growth and new opportunities for the Club. We are proud to share that the Whittier Area Literacy Council and the Community Connections Program, both household organizations with rich histories of serving the Whittier community, joined us as official Club programs in providing literacy tutoring, college and career readiness, and leadership development to teens. These programs have significantly expanded our impact, equipping more young people with the skills needed to thrive in school and beyond. Additionally, our sports programs expanded across multiple Whittier area school districts, reaching nearly 2,000 students through organized sports activities.

In addition to programs expansion, we made substantial facility upgrades this past year. At our Main Clubhouse, we installed an elevator and renovated community meeting rooms and restrooms, ensuring our spaces are more accessible and better equipped to meet the needs of the youth we serve. At our Pico Rivera site, we established a state-of-the-art fitness center, providing youth with a quality, safe, and accessible space to aid them on their health journey.

In all, along with these advancements and our staple programs of tutoring, mentoring, STEM, arts, and prosocial recreation, we served 4,535 students across 41 program sites located throughout Whittier, Norwalk, Pico Rivera, and Santa Fe Springs.

As we look to the future, we remain committed to adapting and innovating to address the changing needs of our community. Your trust and generosity have made our progress possible, and for that, we are deeply grateful. Together, we can continue helping youth build brighter futures.

Jenice's Story

For one Whittier family, the decision to send their daughter to the Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera was simple. Living nearby, with her grandparents, the Club offered a convenient, safe space where Jenice could be active, engage with other kids, and take advantage of the many programs. For Jenice, it wasn't just about activities—it was about belonging.

"I loved sports, but it wasn't just about that," she recalls. "I liked being there with kids my age, not just adults. It was my space, where I could feel free and safe."

Looking back, she credits BGCW with helping her build confidence and develop the skills that would shape her future. "The Club made me feel like there was a place for me, a space where I could grow," she says. "It gave me a sense of belonging that inspired me to become a teacher, working now with high school students."

Today, with 14 years of teaching experience, she's pursuing a bachelor's degree at CSULB while continuing her work in La Palma and Anaheim. And although she no longer resides in Whittier, she remains deeply connected to her roots. "Whittier is my hometown," she shares. "It's a tight-knit community, and when I had the chance to participate in the Boys & Girls Club's Youth Day Job Fair, I jumped at it. I wanted to give back."

Now, as she continues her career and education, she hopes to return to Whittier to teach at Rio Hondo College and give back to the community that shaped her. "I wish I could bring my daughter to the Club. It's a place that helped me become who I am, and I'd love for her to experience that same support."

For this former member, the Boys & Girls Club wasn't just an after-school program—it was a place that nurtured her growth and connected her to her community.

Clubhouse Improvements

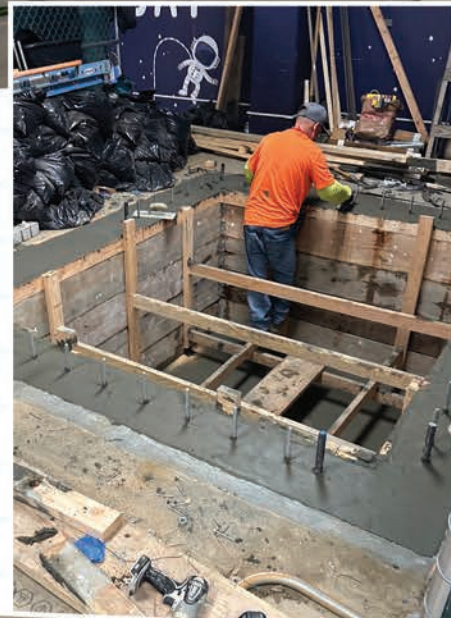
Main Clubhouse Renovation

A community cornerstone since 1972, the Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera's Main Clubhouse is housed in a former City of Whittier fire station. Being over 50 years old, the facility required significant upgrades to meet current safety and accessibility standards, particularly the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. To address these needs, the Club launched a comprehensive renovation project in the past year aimed at enhancing accessibility, safety, and equity.

Key improvements included installing a passenger elevator to improve access to all areas of the two-story Clubhouse and renovating the restrooms to be fully ADA-compliant. The restroom upgrades included installation of grab bars, widening doorways and partitions, and installing accessible toilets and sinks, to ensure ease of use for all members.

In addition to these critical accessibility upgrades, the Club undertook broader renovations to modernize the second floor of the Main Clubhouse, which had not been updated in nearly four decades. Four new community meeting rooms were created, featuring new works stations and collaborative meeting spaces, and flooring throughout the second floor was replaced to enhance safety and esthetics. These improvements reflect the Club's commitment to providing a safe, welcoming, and more functional environment for its rapidly growing membership and workforce.

Clubhouse Improvements

Pico Rivera Club – Community Fitness Center

In the spring of 2024, in partnership with L.A. County 4th District Supervisor Janice Hahn and the El Rancho Unified School District, the Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera officially opened its doors to the El Rancho Community Fitness Center. Aimed at combating youth obesity, related youth health risks, and to promote increased community wellbeing, the El Rancho Unified School District generously provided a 1,500+ square-foot space, which was transformed into a state-of-the-art fitness center through generous funding provided by Supervisor Hahn's office.

This fully equipped facility offers multiple commercial-level weight and cardio training machines, ensuring local teens have access to quality fitness resources. To help coach and mentor young people in their fitness journey, local Sheriff's officers and other trained volunteers facilitate fitness training sessions, offering their guidance and expertise.

These services and access to the fitness center are provided free of charge to all teens in the Pico Rivera community.

Community Connections Program

Welcoming Community Connections to the Club Family

The **Community Connections Program** provides undergraduate students with valuable real-world work experience through partnerships with local colleges and community organizations. This program offers students employment opportunities within key initiatives at the Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera while serving the needs of the surrounding community.



Program Overview:

- **Launch Date:** July 17, 2023
- **Collaborating Colleges:** Rio Hondo College, Cal State Fullerton, Whittier College
- **Target Population:** Undergraduate students seeking hands-on, community-based work experience
- **Number of Students:** Funding through the BCM grant supports 26 college students year-round, with opportunities for rolling hires based on available positions



Key Initiatives and Student Placements:

1. **CORE Program (High School Mentoring):** College students serve as mentors, guiding high school students through academic and personal growth.
2. **Nuestra Voz (Parent Support Group):** Students assist in teaching parents how to support their children's education, focusing on technology skills and academic support.
3. **Blooming Minds (Whittier City School District):** College students support elementary and middle school students in developing key developmental skills and academic success.
4. **Magic Realm (BGCW Main Clubhouse):** A popular after-school program where students help facilitate learning and recreational activities for youth in the club.

Community Service

Engaging Teens Through Community Service: The Playhouse Project

Through the newly established Community Connections Program (CCP), Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera teens participated in a hands-on day of skill-building and community service. In April 2024, thirty teens came together to build three colorful playhouses, each valued at \$2,000. In partnership with Habitat for Humanity and the Whittier Rotary Club, they learned basic construction skills, including painting, tool usage, and teamwork.

Led by CCP staff, the initiative fostered collaboration and personal growth. Whittier College fraternities and sororities, along with Rotary Club members, supported the project, while Habitat provided materials and tools. The teens designed each playhouse, choosing fun themes like Charlie Brown, Bluey, and a garden house. CCP also engaged Whittier College interns to document the project on social media.

Although initially apprehensive about using power tools, the teens grew more confident throughout the day and discovered a passion for hands-on work, with some even expressing an interest in trades. CCP's goal is to offer BGCW members opportunities to explore new skills, especially in areas where interest has declined in recent years.

The playhouses were donated to Habitat for Humanity, the Women and Children's Crisis Center in Whittier, and the BGCW clubhouse, showcasing the impact of community service and teamwork.



Lee Owens & Lifetime Achievement Awards

The Lee Owens Award was created to recognize a recipient from within Boys & Girls Clubs of Whittier | Pico Rivera's service area who exemplifies Lee's own spirit of giving. For more than 30 years, Lee was an avid champion for our Club's growth and development and a grand supporter who always stepped up when there was a need. But most of all he was a compassionate man who wanted to see our youth have a safe and fun place to call their own - place that was founded on respect for others, belief in talents, and the potential in us all.

Revitalizing Youth Sports: The (Re)Launch of the Mamba League



In January 2024, Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera welcomed a new athletic director who helped re-launch the Mamba League, marking a key step in our continued efforts to return to youth sports post-pandemic. The league included teams from districts such as Whittier, Little Lake, and South Whittier, with a special focus on increasing female participation. Members had the opportunity to participate in the 12-week program which featured six boys' teams and seven girls' teams, culminating in a championship tournament at the University of California's Galen Center where they competed with other Clubs from across Los Angeles County.

The Main Clubhouse boys' team and Ada Nelson School girls' team emerged victorious, highlighting the talent of our young athletes. The league's success reignited community spirit, with strong support from parents and coaches. Thanks to Nike, the program operates at no cost to participants, providing uniforms and gear. Practices are held twice a week, and games occur weekly, promoting teamwork and discipline.

Looking forward, we aim to boost participation by starting promotions earlier and addressing transportation barriers for families, with hopes for more funding from Nike.

In the summer of 2023, WALC merged with the Boys & Girls Club of Whittier | Pico Rivera, becoming one of the Club's official programs.

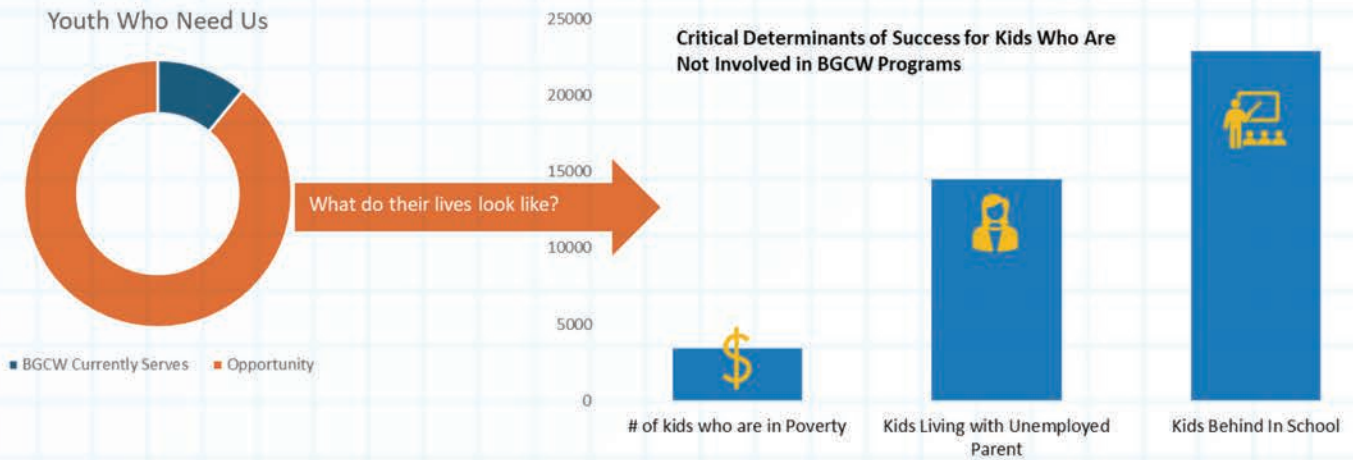
We are honored to continue WALC's legacy of providing such vital services to the community.

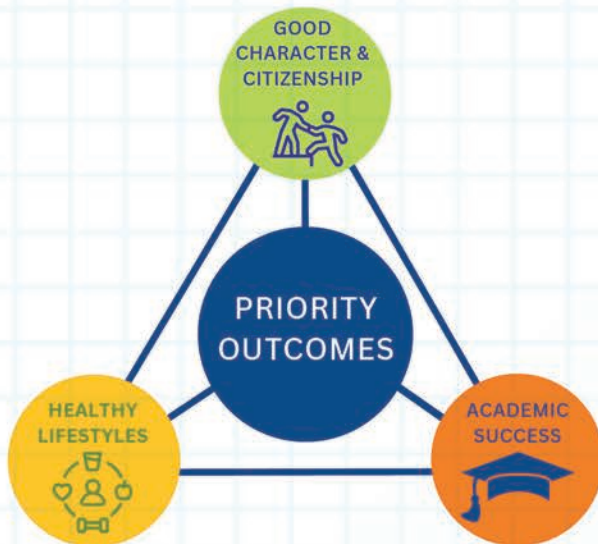

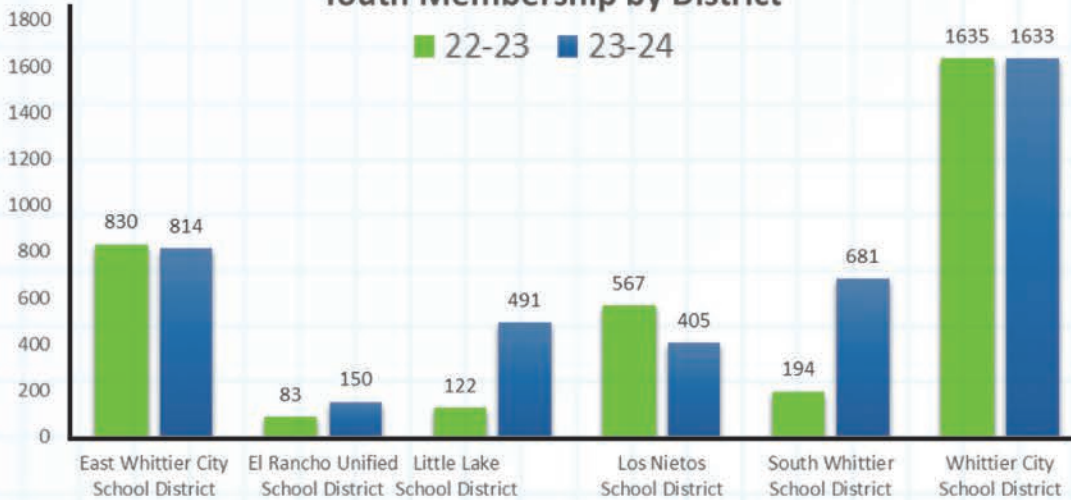
93% of Whittier Club students reported receiving C's or better and are on track to graduate from high school, compared to 82% of L.A. County's general student population

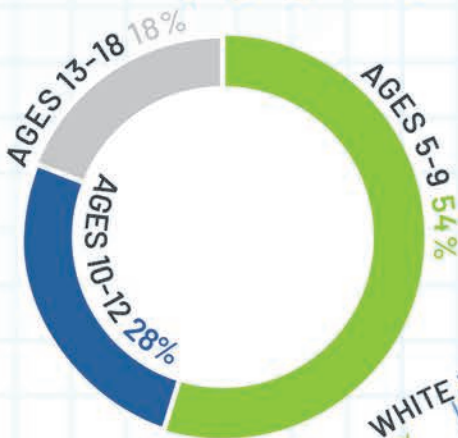
71% of Whittier Club students consumed vegetables daily, compared to only 51% of the national youth population

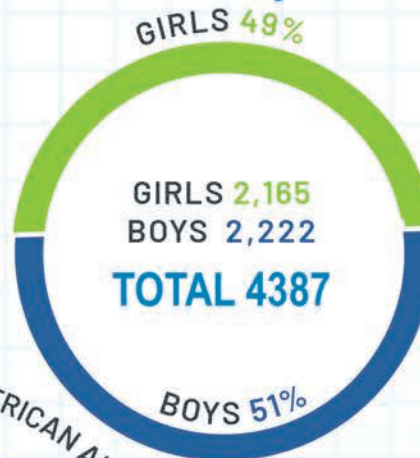
Youth Membership by District



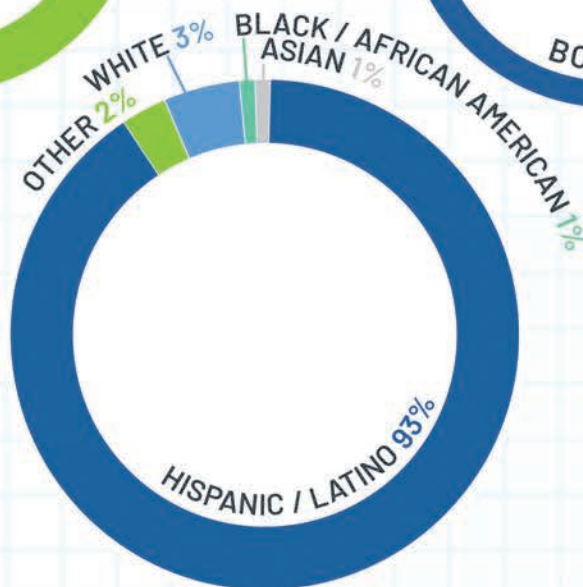
Membership by Age Group

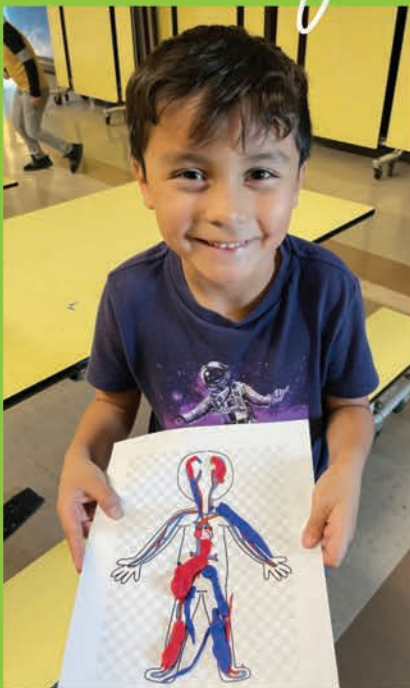
